Issues for advocacy for GPDV & divisions

- **To DoHA:**

- Increased funding for undergraduate teaching
- Increased funding for capital infrastructure capacity building in teaching practices (The extra room)
- Develop with universities, process of accreditation for the teachers of undergraduates and for the professional development of GP teachers
- Consider reduction in HECS debt to graduates who choose general practice

Issues for advocacy for GPDV & divisions

- **To state government:**
 - Adequate funding for capital infrastructure for practices which undertake PGPPP registrar terms
- **To AGPN:**
 - To support the need for increased federal funding as outlined above

Roles for divisions

- Work in partnership(s) with universities, teaching hospitals & RTPs to recruit and resource practices to cope with demand for undergraduate PGPPP and training program education
- Promote the teaching of undergraduates, PGPPP and the training program among their practices
- Create membership categories for all undergraduates & PGY's who come to general practice
